Instructions for Course Registration:

- Course selections for 2024-25 will be downloaded from the student's four-year plan.
 - Courses listed in Year 1 will be the student's courses for next year.
- Students and parents can access the student four-year plan through SAC (Student Access Center) and PAC (Parent Access Center), respectively. (If further instructions are needed, go to the College Park counselors' web page.)
- Full year courses must have an A and B semester. (Course numbers must match). If a student chooses a half credit course (one semester), they must choose another half credit course for the second semester.
- Students should select a total of 7 credits (before alternates).
- Teachers have made course advisements. The advisements are reflected on the student's four-year plan. Students and parents should carefully consider the advisement before making a final course selection.
- Advanced courses will require an Advanced Course Agreement form. These forms will be sent electronically at the close of course registration.
- Some courses may not be available for student selection. Reasons for this may be:
 - The courses require a tryout. After tryouts, the sponsor will provide a list of approved students to the counselors. (i.e., Cheerleading, Drill Team, Color Guard.)
 - The course requires a prerequisite that the student has not completed.
 - The student is not in the appropriate grade for the course.
 - The course is listed elsewhere in the student's four-year plan. (Students will need to edit the plan and move the course.)
- •Students must list 3 credits of alternates. List in order of priority.
- •In order to change a course listed in the plan, click on the red "X".
